## Australian Koala Foundation

### Keeping Koalas Safe with Responsible Pet Ownership

In SE QLD, koalas are listed by the Government as vulnerable to extinction. The Australian Koala Foundation estimates there are only around 100 000 koalas left in the wild throughout Australia, with numbers diminishing fast. SE QLD and NE NSW are traditionally the koala's most abundant range, but with this now pegged for Australia's booming development industry, habitat loss and irresponsible urbanisation are leading to steep declines and local extinctions for koalas.

Nearly 10% of koala deaths in SE QLD are as a result of a dog attack. The presence of dogs and fences do not deter a koala when it is determined to reach a tree. Even a little nip or a chase is enough to kill a koala; they shock very easily and the stress alone often triggers disease in the animal.

The Australian Koala Foundation recommends restraining or keeping dogs inside at night, when koalas are most active. Koala friendly fences will also ensure a quick escape route in pet owners' backyards. We moved into koala's backyards, they didn't move into ours – help spread the message of responsible pet ownership to your friends.
